“Media, Information, Digital Literacy Framework Finalised”

Cambodia is finalising an important policy to promote media, information, and digital literacy. On 20th-21st June, 41 representatives from civil society groups and the government validated the National Media, Information and Digital Literacy (MIDL) with UNESCO to finish the policy in 2021. The government, civil society and UNESCO have the common goal to strengthen to ensure that the media, information and digital literacy can flourish. These goals align with the UN Sustainable Development Goals, the priorities of the Cambodian government in its efforts in digital transformation and the fulfilment of human rights for everyone, as well as to strengthen Cambodia’s potential to be a dynamic digital economy.
